

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery." [Galatians 5:1]

For a week near the beginning of May, I have the honor and joy of representing the ELCA and the Indiana-Kentucky Synod as a voting member of the Twelfth Assembly of the Lutheran World Federation (LWF). This gathering of some 800 representatives and guests of the 145 member Lutheran churches from 98 countries occurs once every six to seven years and is the LWF's highest decision-making body. This year, we will gather in Windhoek, Namibia, Africa. The Assembly will give general direction to the work of the LWF for the next few years. It will speak out on issues concerning the life and witness of the churches and the world. It will elect the LWF President and Council to serve until the next Assembly. At this Assembly the LWF will also commemorate the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation in grand global fashion.

The theme for this assembly is "Liberated by God's Grace," supported by three sub-themes: "Salvation—Not for Sale," "Human Beings— Not for Sale," and "Creation—Not for Sale." In the introduction to the Study Book for the Assembly is found this great nugget of a paragraph:

The Lutheran concept of liberation and freedom is closely linked to the doctrine of justification by faith through grace. According to the Lutheran tradition, this doctrine has also been called "the doctrine by which the church stands or falls." It affirms that in Christ God's love is given to us as a free and unconditional gift. The experience of forgiveness, of God's grace, and God's unconditional love frees us from fear, and allows us to express our gratitude through the loving and caring engagement with human beings and the whole of creation.

This helpful summary of the core Lutheran understanding of the good news reminds us that in Christ and by grace we are set free **from** fear and **from** having to secure our own salvation. But this freedom is not self-centered. This grace leads to responsible freedom. In other words, we are also set free to love our neighbor and all creation with the forgiveness, grace, and love of Christ that we ourselves have received from God. As the LWF Study Book puts it, for Martin Luther this meant "Christian freedom was personal, but never private. Freedom was a calling to public service. According to Luther, God has called the church to be a 'living word' in the world. To be a 'living word' in the world also means to be committed to diaconal service, raising one's voice, and taking action against the oppression of the poor, the persecuted, and the marginalized."

Set free in Christ, we proclaim with our lives and our words: Salvation is not for sale. Human beings are not for sale. Creation is not for sale.

I invite you to join with your sisters and brothers from around the world in reflecting on these powerful, transformational themes during the month of May.

What have you been set free **from** in Christ? What have you been set free **to**? How might what you do and say more clearly reflect and share the amazing good news that we – and our world – are liberated by God's grace?
