Voting 'Christian first': What does that mean at the ballot box?

"For though I am free with respect to all, I have made myself a slave to all" -1 Corinthians 9:19

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Consider the 'all' in All Saints Day

When November 1 arrives on any day other than Sunday, the observance of All Saints Day is transferred to the nearest Sunday and appropriately renamed All Saints Sunday.

On November 3, Gloria Dei will mark All Saints Sunday with two special occasions: celebrating the recently confirmed and recalling the faithful departed.

In an essay recently reprinted in *Living Lutheran*, Benjamin M. Stewart, a professor at Lutheran School of theology Chicago, notes that All Saints Day "originally honored those who were considered especially holy: heroic figures from the Scriptures and martyrs who had given their lives nonviolently in witness to the faith."

Through the centuries it has become a way to remember the lives of all saints. He cautions, "There is a lot of meaning packed into the word all in All Saints, which can refer both to those "most beloved by us" and to those" beloved by others."

For Lutherans, Stewart writes, "All Saints resonates with the conviction that in Christ every saint is a sinner and every sinner a saint, *simul justus et peccator*. Lutherans especially remember on this feast that it is God's grace, apart from our works, that makes us saints. We find lasting rest only in the mercy of God."



Stephen died October 10, with his family at his side in Bay Village, Ohio. A memorial service was to be at 10 a.m. November 2

at Gloria Dei, with Pastor Patrick presiding. A reception in the Fellowship Hall was followed by a private graveside service. He was 46.

Born November 7, 1977, to Carol and Brian Saine in South Bend. Stephen was baptized at Gloria Dei and was a lifelong member, attending Sunday School, participating in the

annual Santa Lucia festival, and ushering for many years. While no official records exist, it would be safe to say that he has the longest tenure greeting members and guests, taking attendance, and collecting and presenting our weekly offerings at the altar. His ardent devotion to Notre Dame and Chicago sports (Cubs and Blackhawks) is legendary, and his Sunday-morning mood fluctuated with the fortunes and misfortunes of his favorite teams.

Growing up in Mishawaka and a 1999 graduate of Penn High School, Stephen participated in many activities and "was especially proud "of his gold medal in powerlifting at the 1999 International Special Olympics Games.

Stephen was a "hard worker" at McDonald Physical Therapy and recently was recognized for 25 years of employment there.

Martin Luther summarized it this way, "A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all."

And so when I vote, and when I learn about the results of the vote, I keep Jesus' twin commands front and center: "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind" and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Surely each one of us will have issues decided or candidates elected that we are excited about, and candidates and issues that cause us great concern or discomfort. In a diverse democracy, this is always the case. But these issues and candidates are temporary; God's love and justice is forever.

So, as we participate in the election with our hearts and minds set on Godly things, let us also continue to pray for all the candidates, to pray for those whom we disagree with, and to pray for peace. And most importantly, may we always remember that Jesus Christ is Lord yesterday, today, and tomorrow, and nothing can separate us from the love, grace, and blessings we have through him.

St. Nick, Lucia redux; other December dates

Looking ahead to the season of Advent, Christmas, and the end of the calendar year, here is the schedule, as of the end of October, of Sunday services and special events at Gloria Dei.

Nov. 24, Christ the King Sunday, marks the end of the liturgical year, and the following Sunday, December 1, is the First Sunday of Advent. On each of the Wednesdays in Advent, December 4, 11, and 18, there will be a spoken service, with communion, at noon, in our sanctuary.

"Ere he drove out of sight" last December, Saint Nicholas exclaimed, "Merry Christmas to all, and I'll see you next year!' This Bishop of Myra has made a reservation for the 9 a.m. service on Dec. 8 and promises "gold coins for all!"

The following Sunday, December 15, we will honor Sankta Lucia, whose feast day, December 13, recalls the witness of Lucia of Syracuse.

centuries later, clad in a white gown, bearing light and food in the darkness of winter and famine, was seen as a promise of hope and deliverance. It will be a Vespers service.

The Nativity of Our Lord, Christmas Eve, will be celebrated at Gloria Dei at 4 p.m. and at First English at 7 p.m. The choir will sing at both services.

Gloria Dei also will have a 10 a.m. service on December 25, with plans for special music. The two congregations will worship together at 10 a.m. December 29, according to the fifth-Sunday service rotation.
